Born and raised on a farm, I learned early on the value of working with nature. As an educator, I created and implemented an instructional curriculum focused on Black and Native American history. I learned much about corporate engagement by working with Father Michael Crosby through an organization called Seventh Generation Interfaith. Those engagements centered on fair labor practices, executive compensation, and tobacco litigation. My relationship with this group continues to this day.

Throughout my life, I've always tried to do the right thing and take the ethical path in my personal and professional life. This includes ESG - environmental, social, and governance – investing, also known as impact or sustainable investing. The approach is based on a straightforward premise: the corporation operates in the public domain. Corporations are responsible for acting in the best interest of their customers, employees, the larger community, and the environment. ESG investing helps hold corporations accountable for their business practices. As corporations and individuals, we must do all we can to pass on a livable world to the next generation.
